Special Provision – for students undertaking a VCE study

Students who we are aware of that meet eligibility requirements for special provision have been mailed out packages today. If you do not receive a package and feel that your son/daughter is eligible for special provision please contact Robyn Andrews – Year 12, Andrew Harms – Year 11 or Marley Richards Year 10.

What is special provision?

Special Provision provides students in defined circumstances with the opportunity to participate in and complete their VCE. It is designed to help students achieve their VCE within the timeframe comparable to their peers.

Students granted special provision are not exempt from meeting the requirements for satisfactory completion or from being assessed against the outcomes for a study.

Underlying principle of special provision is to ensure that the most appropriate, fair and reasonable arrangements and options are available for students to demonstrate their capabilities, if their learning and assessment programs are affected by illness, impairment or personal circumstances. Special Provision should provide equivalent alternative arrangements for students but not confer an advantage over other students.



Slip, Slop, Slap, Seek and Slide!

Two out of three Australians will be diagnosed with skin cancer by the time they reach 70. We have one of the highest rates of skin cancer in the world with over 750,000 Australians being treated for skin cancer each year – that’s over 2,000 people every day.

You are most at risk of skin cancer during times when the UV index is at 3 or above. You can check the daily UV index at www.bom.gov.au/vic/uv/.

The Cancer Council recommends these five simple ways to protect yourself from the harms of skin cancer:


Slip on a shirt or other form of clothing that covers your arms

Slop on sunscreen that’s SPF 30+ and reapply every 2 hours

Slap on a hat with a broad brim or one that covers your face, neck and ears

Seek shade away from direct sunlight

Slide on sunglasses that are close fitting and have UV Protection



But what about vitamin D? During summer, most people can achieve adequate vitamin D levels by exposing their face, arms and hands to direct sunlight for just a few minutes most days of the week.

Remember, treating vitamin D deficiency is a lot easier than treating skin cancer!
